## Session Descriptions/Learning Objectives

#### General Session 1: Ambulatory Orthopedics: New Procedures coming to an ASC Near You!

During this session, attendees will learn the anesthesia and surgical factors needed to perform successful total joint and spine surgery as an outpatient. Strategies to prevent post-discharge pain and avoid admission to the hospital will be emphasized.

#### General Session 2: Ambulatory Practice Management

This session will focus on a number of practical issues in the management of ambulatory patients including measuring outcomes, legal pitfalls, and billing issues for ambulatory anesthesia.

#### General Session 3: The Opioid Crisis in America: Latrogenic?

This session will examine issues pertinent to the opioid crisis including background on how we got here, how extensive this problem is and current measures to limit harms. It will also present an overview of the evaluations and management of opioid dependent patients and those using agonist-antagonists.

#### General Session 4: Anesthesia Issues in the GI Suite

In this session, attendees will learn how to safely and efficiently manage traditional gastrointestinal procedures such as colonoscopies and upper endoscopies, to more advanced endoscopic techniques like endoscopic retrograde cholangiopancreatography (ERCP) in high turnover gastroenterology suites. They will be educated about new techniques that are being employed in GI labs and anesthetic challenges related to them. Attendees will hear methods of performing ERCP with or without intubation and the pros and cons of each technique.

#### General Session 5: Update on Preoperative Cardiac Evaluation

During this session attendees will learn about preoperative cardiac evaluation of the ambulatory patient. Speakers will discuss the updates and changes in the 2014 American College of Cardiology/American Heart Association (ACC/AHA) Updated on Dual Antiplatelet Therapy (DAPT) with a special focus on the timing of surgery after percutaneous coronary interventions with stents. Participants will hear both sides of the debate on whether to continue or discontinue angiotensin converting enzyme inhibitors (ACEi) and angiotensin receptor blockers (ARBs) as well as best practices for patients with pacemakers and implantable cardioverter defibrillators (ICDs).

#### General Session 6: Technology and the Ambulatory Practice: Friend or Foe?

The technology in anesthesia practice is not very new, but applications of it are. This panel will look at making the most of electronic medical records by querying it for secondary signs of quality measures such as PONV. Add-on applications can help with patient satisfaction by getting real-time satisfaction data and messaging patients for aspects of their care. Lastly, the ultrasound machine is not just for doing blocks. This panel will look at different patient examinations that can be done including a cardiac exam.

#### General Session 7: Anesthesia and the Brain: Damage Control

More and more data is becoming available regarding neurodevelopment in pediatric patients and post-op cognitive deficits in adults after anesthesia. This session will present the latest data in both of these areas to help maximize patient outcomes. Lastly, the use of TIVA as a strategy will be discussed and how to make it work in your practice.

#### General Session 8: Cases from the Real World

During this session, attendees will examine actual case scenarios and integrate various methods of care and strategies for preclinical problem solving for ambulatory surgical patients into their daily practice.

#### **OBA Workshop**

At the end of this workshop, participants will become familiar with the important clinical and practice management issues involved in running an office based anesthesia practice. Lectures will focus on patient selection and accreditation/compliance issues. Safety issues in pediatric dental anesthesia will be highlighted.

#### Latin American Session: Disasters in Plastic Surgery

At the conclusion of this session, participants will be able to identify the most likely encountered emergencies in ambulatory plastic surgery and formulate a strategy to respond to these disasters. Topics will include MH, LAST, and fat embolism. The focus will be on office based and small venue ASCs where resources may be limited. A scenario-based approach to disaster preparedness will help reinforce the participants' knowledge base. This session will be presented in English but will offer a real time Spanish translator to facilitate an international audience.

#### Consult the Experts

These small group sessions are specifically designed to provide an opportunity for open and detailed discussions of relevant ambulatory anesthesia and surgery topics. Expert speaker session formats may range from a relatively unstructured "open house," where attendees can stop by and ask specific questions to prepared introductory topic remarks followed by open discussion by the small group.

#### **ASA Update**

Attendees will gain an understanding of the American Society of Anesthesiologists' role as an educational, research, and scientific association of physicians and delineate how practitioners can use its resources to enhance their patient care and professional activities.

#### **Problem-Based Learning Discussions (PBLD)**

Attendees will discuss and critique the evaluation, management, and implementation of patient care in specific ambulatory clinical scenarios.

#### **Excellence and Innovation Presentations**

Attendees will be able to describe focused ambulatory anesthesia knowledge gained through research as presented by scientific abstract awardees.

#### **Hands-On Regional Workshops**

Attendees will demonstrate techniques for peripheral nerve blocks using 'single shot' techniques as well as regional catheters for ambulatory anesthetic management. Attendees will also describe common or serious complications of regional techniques and how to both manage and avoid them.


